

The song earned Warwick her first Grammy Award.

## Song: Viva Las Vegas (1964) Made popular by: Elvis

Brief Context: "Viva Las Vegas" is a 1964 song written for Elvis Presley for his film Viva Las Vegas. In the movie, Elvis plays a race car driver who has to wait tables at a hotel in order to pay off a debt. He performs this song at the hotel's talent competition accompanied by Vegas showgirls.

**Activity:** Listening and Engaged Discussion

What do you need?

- YouTube or recording of Elvis singing "Viva Las Vegas"
- Perfect Harmony visual prompts

- Have you ever been to Las Vegas or gambled?
- What makes you think of glitzy and glamorous Las Vegas? (went to shows, roulette, neon, hot dice, showgirls, blackjack, one-armed bandits (slot machines), bright lights)









# **Song:** Theme from New York, New York (1977) **Made popular by:** Frank Sinatra and Liza Minnelli

Brief Context: "Theme from New York, New York," was written for the 1977 Martin Scorsese movie of the same name. Liza Minnelli sang the song in the movie and a year later, in 1978, Frank Sinatra began performing the song in concert. In 1985, the song was adopted at the unofficial anthem of New York City.

**Activity: Singing and Engaged Discussion**

- Many people move to New York City to accomplish a dream. Have you ever had a dream you've wanted to accomplish?



- The singer talks about missing home and returning to Georgia. Have you ever gone away from home for a while and then returned?
