# Song: "On a Clear Day (You Can See Forever)" (1965) Songwriters: Burton Lane and Alan Jay Lerner

#### **Brief Context:**

"On a Clear Day" is a song composed by Burton Lane with lyrics by Alan Jay Lerner, originally written for the 1965 Broadway musical *On a Clear Day You Can See Forever*. Barbra Streisand's rendition in the 1970 film adaptation remains the most iconic. Over the years, the song has been recorded by a wide range of artists and reimagined by jazz combos, big bands and vocal groups. Lyrically, it captures a sense of hope, clarity, and personal insight—moments when one sees beyond individual limits and feels a deeper connection to the universe. It speaks to the discovery of inner truth, understanding, and the harmony found in nature.

Song: "Edelweiss" (1959)

Songwriters: Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II

#### **Brief Context:**

"Edelweiss" is a song from the 1959 Rodgers and Hammerstein musical *The Sound of Music*, written for the character of Captain von Trapp. Named after the delicate white Alpine flower, it symbolizes his love and loyalty to Austria. In the film, he sings it first while reconnecting with his children, and later in a concert as a quiet act of defiance. Though it sounds like a traditional folk tune, it was written for the show and was the final song Oscar Hammerstein II completed before his death. Its simple melody and heartfelt lyrics have made it one of the most beloved songs from the musical.

# Song: "You Are the Sunshine of My Life" (1973) Recorded by Stevie Wonder

### **Brief Context:**

"You Are the Sunshine of My Life" is a song by Stevie Wonder from his 1972 album Talking Book. Released as a single in 1973, it became his third number-one hit on the Billboard Hot 100 and earned him a GRAMMY Award for Best Male Pop Vocal Performance. Interestingly, the first two lines of the song are not sung by Wonder, but by Jim Gilstrap, followed by Lani Groves, with Gloria Barley joining them for background vocals. Wonder's version blends smooth harmonies with a simple, heartfelt melody, making the song one of the most iconic and enduring love songs of the 1970s.

# Song: "Come Rain or Come Shine" (1946) Songwriters: Harold Arlen and Johnny Mercer

#### **Brief Context:**

"Come Rain or Come Shine" is a classic song by composer Harold Arlen and lyricist Johnny Mercer, written for the 1946 Broadway musical *St. Louis Woman*. Known for its emotional depth and unusual opening—built around a single repeated note—the song quickly became a jazz standard. Over time, it's been embraced by countless artists for its soulful message of unconditional love and its bold, memorable melody.

Song: "What a Wonderful World" (1967)

Songwriters: Bob Thiele (as George Douglas)

and George David Weiss

#### **Brief Context:**

"What a Wonderful World" was written by Bob Thiele (as George Douglas) and George David Weiss for Louis Armstrong, who first recorded it in 1967. The writers felt Armstrong's warm, soulful voice could best convey their hopeful message—that even in difficult times, the world is full of beauty, love, and kindness. Inspired by the unrest of the late 1960s, including war, civil rights struggles, and political tension, the song aimed to bring a sense of calm and optimism. Initially, it received little promotion in the U.S. due to resistance from the record label, but it found success in the U.K. and became a worldwide favorite after its re-release in 1988, following its appearance in the film *Good Morning*, *Vietnam*. Today, the song continues to inspire listeners of all ages and remains one of Louis Armstrong's most beloved recordings.
